Created by the National Endowment for the Arts, in partnership with the Poetry Foundation and the Montana Arts Council, this program helps students master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about their literary heritage.

Beginning at the classroom level, winners advance to a schoolwide competition and then to a regional competition before advancing to State Finals. Ultimately, a state champion will emerge to represent Montana at the National Finals.

One winner at the state level will receive \$200 and an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C. (with parent or chaperone) to compete for the national championship. The state winner's school will receive a \$500 stipend for the purchase of poetry books. A runner-up in each state will recieve \$100, with \$200 for their school library. A total of \$50,000 in scholarships and school stipends will be awarded for the winners at the National Finals.

CHRIS LA TRAY Montana poet laureate

JANUARY

"I don't consider my efforts as a poet to be so much a career as a way of living. In Anishinaabe world view, to live an Anishinaabe life is to make every footstep a prayer; as a poet, attaching a poetic world view—where every observable moment may be viewed as a poem—to the Anishinaabe one, one seeks to make every footstep a poem as well. Serving as Poet Laureate will allow me to share that perspective with more people, in service to people, which is something our wider community needs. Serving as Poet Laureate is exactly that: service."

Chris La Tray has authored two collections of poetry: *One-Sentence Journal: Short Poems and Essays from the World at Large* and *Descended From a Travel-worn Satchel: Haiku & Haibun*. His debut collection, *One-Sentence Journal*, received multiple honors including the 2018 Montana Book Award, the 2019 High Plains Book Award (Best First Book), and finalist for the 2019 High Plains Book Award (Best Book by Indigenous Writer). His third book, *Becoming Little Shell*, will be published in 2024 by Milkweed Editions.

"I'm excited to have this opportunity," Chris says of becoming Montana's Poet Laureate. "I never considered myself a poet till other people started calling me one." Speaking of his plans for the role, Chris notes his interest in getting to places that might be overlooked as venues for poetry. "I look forward to taking it on the road, out to all the tribal colleges. I just got a call from Wibaux. I'm stoked—Wibaux is practically North Dakota!" Chris also plans to continue working with Montana's Office of Public Instruction and Humanities Montana as part of its Indian Education for All Initiative, educating Montanans about its history through the perspectives of the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa and Métis cultures.

Raised in Frenchtown, Chris is a member of the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians and his facility with words is not unique in his family; Chris' Métis great-great-grandfather Mose served as an interpreter for the US Army, speaking at least six languages, and Chris is today an advocate for reviving Indigenous languages spoken in Montana. Prior to publication of his first book Chris was a contributing writer to the *Missoula Independent* and had published fiction and nonfiction works in a number of publications. He maintains an online journal, *An Irritable Métis*, where he grapples with issues of cultural identity, the natural world, and where this place called Montana is going.



Most recently, *In the Weeds*, Drumlummon Institute, appeared in 2021. Mark is the editor of the Montana Poets Series for FootHills Publishing, and served as Montana's tenth Poet Laureate from 2021 to 2023. In that capacity he produced sixty interviews of Montana poets entitled *Poets in Montana* now archived on MCAT's YouTube Channel and at Humanities Montana.

Mark has been teaching poetry in Montana for four decades and still works for the Missoula Writing Collaborative. He has been involved with Poetry Out Loud since its inception serving as a judge and recitation coach over the last two decades.

Mark lives in Missoula with his wife, Pam, in the lower Rattlesnake Valley.



Aaron Parrett

Aaron Parrett is a professor of English at the University of Providence. He has written many books, articles, and essays, including *Montana: Then and Now* (2014), and *Literary Butte* (2015). In 2017 he printed a collection of previously published fiction in a fine letterpress edition called *Maple & Lead* (Territorial Press) to critical acclaim, which won an Artist Innovation Award from the Montana Arts Council as well as a High Plains Book

Award. A fiddler and songwriter, he has also released several CDs and LPs of original music, including the acclaimed *The Sinners* (1996). Along with writer Russell Rowland, Parrett co-founded a monthly podcast about Montana literature called *Breakfast in Montana*. He is also Executive Director of The Drumlummon Institute, a nonprofit 501 (c) 3 in Helena devoted to publication of quality art and literature related to Montana and the West.



Caroline Patterson

Caroline Patterson is the author of *The Stone Sister*, winner of the 2021 Big Moose Prize from Black Lawrence Press and winner of the 2022 High Plains Book Festival first prize for women's fiction. She published the collection, *Ballet at the Moose Lodge*, a literary anthology *Montana Women Writers: A Geography of the Heart*, which won a gold Willa Prize. Her

work has been included in anthologies including *A Million Acres, Montana Noir, Bright Bones,* and *The New Montana Story* as well as publications including *Southwest Review, Epoch,* and *Seventeen.* A graduate of the University of Montana creative writing program in fiction, she was awarded the Wallace Stegner Fellowship in fiction at Stanford University, the Joseph Henry Jackson Prize



from the San Francisco Foundation, and a 2021 Artist Innovation Award from the Montana Arts Council. She has been awarded residencies at Ucross, the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts and Ragdale. In 2021, she retired as the executive director from the Missoula Writing Collaborative where she worked since 2014, putting writers to teach poetry in 40 rural, tribal and town schools in western Montana. She is currently at work on a new novel.

Caroline lives with her husband, writer Fred Haefele, in the Missoula home her great-grandfather built in 1906 on the banks of the Clark Fork River where, he came when his five-yearold son sickened back in Chicago. She and Fred share the house with their dog, Marlowe, who insists they get out for his daily constitutional.



Natalie Peeterse

Natalie Peeterse is the co-author of the graphic novel *Thunderous*, which won a High Plains Book Award in 2023. Her poetry chapbook *Black Birds: Blue Horse, An Elegy* won the Gold Line Press Poetry Prize in 2011. A second poetry chapbook, *Dreadful : Luminosity, Letters,* was published by Educe Press in the spring of 2017. She was included in *I Go to the Ruined Place: Contemporary Poems in Defense of Global Human Rights*

(Lost Horse Press), and several other anthologies. Natalie has an MFA from the University of Montana and has been a fellow with the Arizona Commission on the Arts, a participant at the Squaw Valley Community of Writers, an artist in residence at the Caldera Institute, a participant in the 2018 US Poets in Mexico in Merida, Yucatan and most recently a Visiting Scholar at the University of Washington's Whiteley Center at the Friday Harbor Laboratories. She is a recipient of the 2013 Artist Innovation Award by the Montana Arts Council. She lives in Helena, Montana.

There are too many clouds to see how the morning stars gaze over Butte but I stare skyward anyway, early cold embracing me like a blanket, pieces from the broken sidewalk reminding my bare feet of their softness. In the little green house where a single lamp glows away the darkness a gas furnace hisses and bangs and grumbles over being called on to warm me up. The day's work looms near and I sit a few moments more in a silence full of sounds, wondering at the local foxes, waiting for the coffee to kick on.

Dear Butte

A stranger, where might I begin to love this place should I find the need to stay? Northward, high over the city, with its jagged skyline of headframes nodding to old industrial glory, roads of cracked pavement and dirt, sloping and winding and twisting, and always reflecting as I climb that this must suck in winter. And what of winter up here over 6000', near double the elevation where I live? Winds howl in all seasons and spring is notoriously slow in arriving before summer heat settles in with a grudge.
