Status of Arts Education

Dear Principals,

The Office of Public Instruction and the Montana Arts Council request your participation in a study to help establish important and missing baseline information in the area of arts education in Montana. This study will benefit schools by annually measuring arts education in Montana, providing you with consistent and credible data for your school. It will also illustrate where more tools and resources need to be provided and where the arts council could specifically target funding and resources to help your school.

One of the core subjects defined in NCLB is the arts. Because the arts are not tested annually, it is hard to assess the status of schools' arts education programs. The study we are conducting will be done annually for the next three years, and subsequently every third year thereafter. It will provide a snapshot to show you how your school compares to others, both statewide and regionally. The same study is being conducted concurrently in Idaho, Wyoming and Utah. The Western States Arts Federation has convened the state arts councils in these four states during the past two years to develop the parameters for this study. Schools participating in the study will receive the executive summary and full Montana report each year.

This is an important time to focus on arts education. Research suggests that arts education has a positive affect on emotional intelligence and that graduation rates increase in schools with more involvement in the arts, thereby producing a return on investment for arts education. While studies have shown the positive effects of arts education, there is an absence of consistent data within the field. This study will fill that gap. Thank you for your participation.
